


- MSD Historic deal Struck August 14 45 year agreement

- 911 Emergency Communications Funded without a tax hike
- County Health, Safety and Welfare -
- Opioids Advanced Treatment, Prevention, Interdiction and reduced harm
- Children's Services Study commissioned; Funding for Ombudsman; Increased funds for caseworkers, implemented worker protections
- Infant Mortality Phase 2 Strategic Plan developed; Reduced numbers of deaths-in all categories

MSD to transition to county; more efficient, effective operations to save funds and help keep rates low




The county's discretionary spending falls into these general categories






FC Cincinnati -


Revenues - Reduced substantially, sales tax growth lagging, 2019 revenues even less

State and Federal funding sources - funds being withdrawn,


especially from state of Ohio

- Look for MOUs to begin






- Infrastructure funding via \$5Auto fee

- Land Bank programs to continue but with new programs to aid Legacy Properties
- Introduce New housing redevelopment initiative and jobs bill via HUD 203K loan funds and HCDC
- Access to Development Sites
- •TID Funding, HB 26 funds; other grant access to support site access; bike paths and urban growth

- •Inclusion Robert Bell and BOLD Vision presented to inclusion Advisory Board
- •Appointments to Boards and Commissions continue positive progress with 88 appointments, 55% women and 40% African American
- Inclusion policies applied to all contracts
- •Apply new policy for workforce expansion, local jobs bill and use of county departments and resources
- ReEntry and second chance offering
- •Look to include people with disabilities -the greatest in number demographic without work
- Board leads on Gender Equality, Pay Equity issues at County.

Using Infant Mortality Reduction to Drive:

- •Improved Maternal and Child Care
- •Continue Historic reductions in infant deaths
- •Expansion of Dental care will help reduce IM; and will improve overall health of the County



Improved Safety Services by:

- •Reduced Jail Congestion
- Resolving Patrol Services contract issues with the Townships
- ●Concluding 911 emergency dispatch detail rate concerns
