
Hoxworth Blood Drive Results

Job and Family Services Award

JFSWEB, the Intranet for the Hamilton County Department of Job and Family Services, recently captured first place in a six-state competition.

The intranet took honors in the Internal Communication category of the annual competition sponsored by

the East Central District of the Public Relations Society of America (PRSA), competing against entries from county, state and local governments in Ohio, Michigan, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Indiana and Kentucky.

The winning entry demonstrated how Job and Family Services is using a strategic approach to build and maintain an intranet that helps employees reach greater

levels of productivity, higher morale and a more complete understanding of the agency's environment and the economic climate that affects it.

A team of section authors managed by the agency's Communications office and supported by its Information Systems function maintains the intranet. JFSWEB has several interactive features,

such as "Ask Administration" where employees post questions and receive prompt answers. Workers can also salute cohorts in the "Employee Kudos" area.

Approximately 950 of the agency's 1500 employees utilize the intranet daily.

Certified Facility Manager designation earned by Mark Hardin

Mark Hardin, Hamilton County Facilities Department's Trades Superintendent, earned the designation of Certified Facility Manager (CFM) from the International Facility Management Association (IFMA) on December 20, 2002. The CFM designation represents that the recipient is a competent facility professional through their work experience, education and the ability to pass a comprehensive examination.

The International Facility Management Association is the premier professional association for facility management. Supporting the largest community facility management professionals in the industry, IFMA membership comprises more than 18,000 facility professionals throughout 50 countries. IFMA was established in 1980 as a not-for-profit, incorporated association dedicated to promoting excellence in the management of facilities. Globally, IFMA spots trends, conducts research, provides educational programs, and assists corporate and organizational facility managers in developing strategies to manage human, facility and real estate resources.

Mark is also a member of the Public Sector Facilities council of IFMA. This council is set up specially for those managing, maintaining or constructing government buildings and facilities. The council addresses the constraints of budgets, organization policies and bureaucracy in city, state, provincial or federal government agencies.

Federal Budget Delays

President Bush signed a bill into public law on January 10, 2003 that keeps all federal government departments, except Defense, operating on roughly last year's spending levels through January 31.

Unfortunately, this means a further delay in the announcement of the majority of federal grants and pass-through grants to the states. The President has asked Congress to pass the budget before January 28. Because of the possibility that Congress will not be able to agree on overall spending levels, adoption of a final budget may not happen until February or later.
