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New Public Safety Radio System For Hamilton County Completed

A special ceremony will be held July 16, 2003 to announce completion of Phase II of the new, state-of-the-art Hamilton County Public Safety Communications System (HCPSCS). The digital 800 MHz radio system uses Motorola's advanced digital technologies and provides superior two-way communications capability to public safety agencies across the County.

The HCPSCS replaces the old fire and EMS radio system. It is the first communications system available to all public safety agencies in the county. Users with a radio on the system will be able to talk to anyone on the new county system.

“Keeping our communities

and families safe plays a critical role in our effort to provide a reliable emergency communications system” Commissioner John Dowlin said. “This state-of-the-art system gives law enforcement and public safety organizations all over Hamilton County a valuable tool to help assure the protection and public health of the people in our neighborhoods.”

In order to help communities transition to the new radio system, the Commissioners provided nearly 2,000 radios, at no cost, to the participating jurisdictions. Over 100 public safety agencies, serving 42 municipalities, are expected to use the new radio system.

Chief John Vail, president of the Hamilton County Fire

Chiefs Association, said, “The July 16th dedication ceremony will celebrate the first time in our county's history that police, fire and EMS will be able to speak to one another on the same radio system. This will greatly enhance day-to-day emergency communications and will have tremendous value when multiple agencies are responding to major events or disasters.”

Confidentiality Notice Now Appended To E-mail Messages Sent From The County

In compliance with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA), language was developed to be appended to e-mail leaving the county from the new email server.

HIPPA calls for standardization of electronic patient health, administrative and financial data; unique health identifiers for individuals, employers, health plans and health care providers; security standards protecting the confidentiality and integrity of individually identifiable health information, past, present and future.

Organizations affected by HIPPA requirements include health care providers, health plans, employers, public health authorities, life insurers, clearinghouses, billing agencies, information system vendors, service organizations, and universities.

The following language was approved at the June Information Processing Advisory Committee meeting to be appended to all e-mail leaving from the county:

This e-mail message, including any attachments, is for the sole use of the intended recipient(s) and may contain private, confidential and/or privileged information. Any unauthorized review, use, disclosure or distribution is prohibited. If you are not the intended recipient, please contact the sender by reply e-mail and destroy all copies of the original message.

This language may be altered based upon the Prosecutor's review.

MSD To Host 2003 Five Cities Plus Conference

The Metropolitan Sewer District of Greater Cincinnati is hosting the Five Cities Plus Conference on August 6-8 at the Marriott Kingsgate Conference Center.

The Five Cities Plus received its name from the five founding cities — Cincinnati, Columbus, Indianapolis, Louisville and St. Louis. After its inception in 1989, ten additional “plus” municipalities and agencies have attended and participated in the conference, including Northern Kentucky Sanitation District No. 1; Butler County; Lexington, Kentucky; Evansville, Indiana; Bloomington, Indiana; Ft. Wayne, Indiana; Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; Nashville, Tennessee; Wheeling, West Virginia; and ORSANCO.

The purpose of the conference is to discuss water quality issues facing

Midwestern cities of similar size. Participants at previous conferences discussed topics concerning new or innovative wastewater management approaches, new regulations, watershed management and applied water pollution control technology.

Topics considered for the 2003 conference include: facility security, design-build, trenchless technology, pretreatment issues, regulatory issues, water quality, among other topics. Each session will be facilitated by a session manager.

The audience is expected to draw 250 to 300 people from municipal and regulatory agencies involved with wastewater collection and treatment systems.
