## 2004 Hamilton County Budget

The total general fund budget for 2004 is \$258.3 million. This represents a \$0.4 million decrease from the 2003 general fund approved appropriation of \$258.7 million. Ongoing general fund revenues exceed ongoing expenditures by \$42,216. The 2004 budget includes \$16.5 million of one-time expenditures.

County Commissioners, John Dowlin, Phil Heimlich, and Todd Portune adopted a

budget goal for 2004 to increase the undedicated general fund reserves to 20% by 2006. The budget includes significant progress on this goal. The combination of projected general fund reserves (\$25.0 million) and the unreserved component of the Budget Stabilization Fund (\$7.5 million) equals \$32.5 million or 13.4% of the ongoing general fund expenditure level of \$242 million.



The total 2004 budget is \$2.29 billion, an increase over the \$2.19 billion budget adopted for 2003. The majority of the increase is occurring in the Department of Jobs and Family Services (JFS) program area. For the fourth consecutive year, JFS is continuing to experience significant entitle-

ment payment increases in the Medicaid area. These increases do not require the county to raise additional local funds as the programs are funded through state and federal payments.

Other areas of increase equal to or greater than \$5 million include:

- ♦ JFS — The increase is due to an accounting change (\$30 million) and one time expenditures primarily related to closing out the Magellan managed care contract (\$10 million).
- ♦ Mental Retardation-Development Disabilities (MRDD) — The 2004 MRDD budget is in line with the 2004 levy plan. Since the beginning of the current levy period in 2000, MRDD has consistently been under the annual levy plan amounts in order to not end the levy period with a negative balance. The increase in 2004 from 2003 brings the MRDD budget back in line with that plan while still projecting a positive fund balance at the end of 2004. Additional funds in 2004 are provided to cover increased staffing,

building repair and maintenance, bus rental costs and increased support for state waiver services.

- ♦ Sheriff — The Sheriff Department's budget increases approximately \$5 million due to increased personnel expenses related to union contract negotiations, increased medical costs, and increased expenses for overtime. There are also increases in medical services for inmates and the inmate food service contract.
- ♦ Debt — The 1993 courthouse debt will be called at a one-time cost of \$5.7 million. This early redemption will result in reduced debt payments through 2011 and a total net interest savings of \$1.1 million. The debt retirement will eliminate \$1.0 million from the 2004 ongoing debt service budget. This call will eliminate future interest costs and free up additional debt capacity.

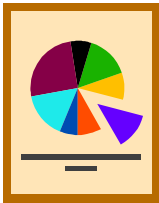

## Budget

The Metropolitan Sewer District's (MSD) budget increases approximately \$15 million. \$9 million of the increase is due to implementation of the Global Consent Decree. The balance of the increase is for ongoing operational increases. The MSD budget submitted through the City of Cincinnati requires a 5% rate increase. The department had originally anticipated a need for a 7% rate increase for 2004. The smaller increase is the result of the department holding the line on operating expenses and a favorable interest rate environment for the 2003 debt issuance. The budget includes expenses and an additional 9% rate increase in anticipation of a potential Consent Decree settlement.



The budget funds 6,339 total positions. There was a net reduction

of approximately 18 positions during 2003 and 12.50 positions are added for 2004. This results in an overall reduction of approximately six positions from 2003. There are no new positions recommended for the general fund.

This budget includes funding for salary increases averaging 3.0% of the 2003 salary amounts for nonrepresented staff and represented staff with contracts linked to the county allocation for nonrepresented staff. The 3% adjustment is consistent with a review of market conditions and information, such as the Chamber of Commerce and other salary studies. The 2004 budget includes funding for union contracts, as negotiated.

Also included in this budget, consistent with the Board's pay-for-performance compensation system, are two 1% supplemental salary adjustments for participating departments. Supplemental salary adjustments do not increase the annual salary base, as they considered "one time" adjustments.



The budget includes a 3.5% turnover rate that was applied to all general fund departments with the exception of those departments with fewer than 20 positions. No turnover rate was applied to those departments. This is an increase from the 3% turnover rate that has been used in recent years. Actual turnover for the past four years has been approximately 5%.

## 2004 Budget Goals

1. The 2004 budget will be submitted to the Commissioners in November to allow sufficient review time for adoption by January 1, 2004.
2. The 2004 budget will be based on current tax revenue adjusted to reflect growth and/or reductions anticipated in 2004.
3. All special funds shall, to the extent possible, reimburse the general fund for both direct and indirect costs.
4. The 2004 budget will be utilized to coordinate special levies to ensure there is no duplication of services and that the respective levies take responsibility for all obligations.
5. The level of ongoing general fund revenue shall meet or exceed the level of ongoing expenditures. New or expanded services will be separated from existing ones.
6. The 2004 budget will maximize federal and state revenues through a detailed analysis to ensure that all general fund expenditures are being appropriately identified and charged to the correct federal/state program.
7. The 2004 budget process will be utilized to develop a legislative agenda to address items impacting our ability to administer effectively and fund required and/or necessary programs.

8. The 2004 budget process will include a review of funding opportunities to allow the county to continue being a leader in providing necessary support services to individuals transitioning from welfare to work.
9. The 2004 budget process will carry out federal and state-mandated county responsibilities in the most effective way. The county will continue to aggressively pursue alternative funding sources for these mandates.
10. The 2004 budget process will reserve dollars for employee pay adjustments, if any, according to the county's normal procedure.
11. The 2004 budget will hold the growth of general fund expenditures supported by locally generated funds, expenditures supported by county controlled taxes, and locally set fees under the rate of inflation.
12. Through the 2004 budget the county will continue to increase the undedicated general fund reserves with a goal of reaching a reserve amount of 20% of the general fund by 2006.
13. Beginning in 2004, the county will develop an annual Commissioners' Report Card to citizens.
14. During 2004, the budget will provide for the development of a "gain sharing" program modeled after successful programs in other organizations.
15. The 2004 budget will reserve \$2 million for targeted economic development investments that provide for acceptable rates of return on investment for the county.
16. Through Metropolitan Sewer District (MSD) funds, the 2004 budget will support a county representative for one year with the responsibility of reforming operations and improving customer service provided by MSD.
17. The 2004 budget will support the implementation of recommendations of the Homeland Security Commission as agreed to by the Board of Commissioners.
18. The 2004 budget should continue the county's leadership in serving seniors by continuing the elimination of waiting lists for services provided by the Senior Services levy.
19. The 2004 budget will provide for efforts to complete the collection of Paul Brown Stadium overrun costs from responsible parties.
20. The county will work to meet with Cincinnati, as needed, at no more than four times during 2004 to explore opportunities to keep costs down and minimize overlap in services provided to citizens.
21. Increase county revenue by pursuing changes in state law that provide counties with a voice in the approval of tax increment financing districts.
