## Celebrate Martin Luther King Jr.'s Birthday

Any number of historic moments in the civil rights struggle have been used to identify Martin Luther King, Jr.—organizer of the Montgomery bus boycott, keynote speaker at the March on Washington, youngest Nobel Peace Prize laureate. Most notable, however, is the fact that King, and his policy of nonviolent protest, was the dominant force in the civil rights movement during its decade of greatest achievement, from 1957 to 1968.

King made his first mark on the civil rights movement by mobilizing the black community during a 382-day boycott

of the city's bus lines. Ultimately, the U.S. Supreme Court declared bus segregation unconstitutional.

King will always be remembered for one of the most passionate speeches of his career, delivered at the historic 1963 March on Washington, “I Have A Dream.” Also, in 1963, *Time* magazine named him Person of the Year.

In 1968, King visited Memphis, Tennessee to lend his support to the sanitation men's strike. On the balcony of the Lorraine Hotel just off Beale Street, in Memphis, King was shot by a rifle bullet.

King's legacy, however, lives on. His birthday, January 15, is a national holiday. The Lorraine Hotel is now the National Civil Rights Museum.

## MSD Peak Performance Awards

The Taylor Creek Water Reclamation Facility of the Metropolitan Sewer District (MSD) was recently honored with a Platinum Peak Performance Award for continuous excellence in environmental protection. Given by the Association of Metropolitan Sewerage Agencies (AMSA), this award recognizes the facility for five consecutive years of 100 percent compliance with its National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit. Taylor Creek is one of 10 MSD facilities that won Peak Performance Awards. "This is a significant achievement and one of which we are very proud," said MSD Director Patrick Karney.

The NPDES permit program was developed to protect and improve the water quality of the nation's lakes, rivers, and streams and helps control water pollution by regulating point sources (such as pipes

and manmade ditches) that discharge pollutants into the environment. The permits contain limits on what can be released and include monitoring and reporting requirements, plus other provisions to ensure that the discharges will not harm the local water quality or public health.

Each year, AMSA celebrates the achievements of its member agencies in relation to NPDES permits by issuing three types of Peak Performance Awards:

- ◆ Platinum—Pay special tribute to agency facilities that have received gold awards for five consecutive years.
- ◆ Gold—Honor treatment works that have achieved 100 percent compliance with their NPDES permit for an entire calendar year.
- ◆ Silver—Recognize facilities that have received no more than five NPDES permit violations per calendar year.

## Grant Awards

Two local businesses, BioLumber, Inc. and Cincinnati Paperboard, were both awarded a \$150,000 Recycling Market Development grant from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources and the Hamilton County Solid Waste Management District. The grants will be used to improve efficiency, accept more recyclables, and manufacture more product. BioLumber, Inc. produces structural grade plastic lumber and will divert over 2,500 tons of plastic and glass fibers from the local landfills. Cincinnati Paperboard manufactures 100 percent recycled content paper for the tube and core industries. The District congratulates the two businesses, and thanks all businesses that applied for the grants.

The Solid Waste Management District received an \$18,000 grant from the Ohio Department of Development, Office of Energy Efficiency, to be used to educate the local business industry on sustainable design practices. Seminars to be conducted in 2004 include: Stormwater Management, Writing Green Specifications, and LEED Advanced workshop. Congratulations to the Hamilton County Solid Waste Management District!

## MLK Timeline

**1929 — January 15.** Michael Luther King Jr., later renamed Martin, born to school-teacher Alberta King and Baptist minister Michael Luther King.

**1948 —** King graduates from Morehouse College in Atlanta, Georgia with a B.A.

**1951 —** Graduates with a B.D. from Crozer Theological Seminary in Chester, Pennsylvania.

**1953 —** King marries Coretta Scott in Marion, Alabama. They will have four children: Yolanda Denise, b. 1955; Martin Luther King III, b. 1957; Dexter, b. 1961; Bernice Albertine, b. 1963.

**1954 —** King moves to Montgomery, Alabama to pastor Dexter Avenue Baptist Church.

**1955 —** King finishes his Ph.D. in systematic theology. Bus boycott launched in Montgomery, Alabama.

**1956 — January 26.** King arrested for driving 30 mph in a 25 mph zone. **January 30.** King's house bombed.

**1957 —** Southern Christian Leadership Conference formed. King named first president one month later.

**1958 —** King's first book published, "Stride Toward Freedom." While promoting his book in a Harlem book store, an African American woman stabbed him.

**1959 —** King visits India. He had a lifelong admiration for Mohandas K. Gandhi.

**1960 —** King leaves for Atlanta to pastor his father's church, Ebenezer Baptist Church.

**1962 —** King meets with President John F. Kennedy to urge support for civil rights.

**1963 —** King leads protests in Birmingham for desegregated department store facilities and fair hiring. **April.** Arrested. Writes "Letter From Birmingham Jail." **August 28.** 250,000 civil rights supporters attended the March on Washington. King delivers "I Have A Dream" speech at Lincoln Memorial.

**1964 —** King wins Nobel Peace Prize.

**1964 —** King wins Nobel Peace Prize.

**1965 — January.** King successfully registers to vote and is assaulted by James George Robinson of Birmingham. **February.** King is arrested and jailed while protesting discrimination. Meets with President Lyndon B. Johnson about voting rights for African Americans. **March 16-21.** King and 3,200 people march from Selma to Montgomery.

**1968 — April 4.** King assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee by James Earl Ray.
