Remember, with the increased use of mammography screening, breast cancers are being detected earlier in their development when they are more treatable. The American Cancer Society suggests women aged 40-50 should have a mammography screening every 1-2 years, and women

over 50 years of age should have one every year. More than 97% of women whose breast cancer is found and treated early will survive.

Recycle your Christmas tree!

What will you do with your Christmas tree when the holiday is over? Have you thought about recycling your Christmas tree? It is now easier and more convenient than ever to recycle your tree. Many communities in Hamilton County offer Christmas tree recycling programs,

but for those who don't, the Hamilton County Solid Waste Management District is sponsoring a free Christmas tree recycling program for Hamilton County residents.

On Saturdays only, January 4 and January 11, residents can drop off their trees for recycling, free of charge, between 11:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m., at the following locations:

- East: Evans Landscaping
3700 Roundbottom Road in Newtown
- West: 6717 Bridgetown Road, Kuliga Park, in Green Township
- North: Struble Road and Colerain Avenue, Rumpke Sanitary Landfill in Colerain Township

All ornamentation, tinsel, and lights must be removed from the trees before they are dropped off.

New Hamilton County Flag arrives in Columbus

In celebration of Ohio's 200th birthday, the Ohio Bicentennial Commission asked each county to send its county flag to Columbus. Last summer, Hamilton County created its first flag to participate in the 2003 event when all the county flags will be collectively flown at the Ohio Statehouse on a designated day. According to the Ohio Bicentennial Commission, all counties have committed to providing a flag to be flown at the Statehouse.

The Hamilton County flag was created by Justin Green. The emblem highlights include: Hamilton County's 21 cities, 16 villages and 12 townships are represented by 49 stars; the star on the crossbar of the red "H" represents Cincinnati, the county seat; the gold crown above the crossbar is a reference to Cincinnati, the Queen City; the gold "O" containing the red "H" is the modern abbreviation for the state of Ohio.

The flag currently flies in front of the County Courthouse and is on display in the Board of Commissioners' hearing room, 605 County Administration Building, 138 East Court Street. The flag's emblem has also been adopted by the County EMA's Citizen Corps.

BOMI is a nonprofit organization formed in 1970 to provide comprehensive continuing education in the complex issues involved in the operation and maintenance of building systems. More than 15,000 property professionals have earned one or more BOMI designations.
